National Brain Injury Awareness Month Written by: Anna Fitts

Brain Injury Awareness Month is a major event around the world. There are more than 5.3 million individuals in the United States who are living with a permanent brain injury-related disability. That's one in every 60 people. At least 2.8 million Americans sustain traumatic brain injuries in the United States every year. Many must receive treatments or check-ups long after any symptoms disappear. The largest and oldest foundation focused on brain injuries is the BIAA, established in 1980, uses March to spread awareness and work to better prevent brain injuries. A blue ribbon represents Brain Injury Awareness Month.

Traumatic brain injury (TBI) happens when a sudden, physical assault damages the brain. It is one of the most common causes of disability and death in adults. TBI is a broad term that describes a vast array of injuries that happen to the brain. Brain trauma can cause comas, paralysis, poor balance, and in extreme cases, death. Even methods to remove tumors and the like can cause amnesia, difficulty speaking, or worse. But not all brain injuries are caused by falls. A brain tumor is a growth of cells in the brain or near it. Brain tumors can happen in the brain tissue. Penetrating TBI (open TBI) happens when an object pierces the skull- a bullet, shrapnel, bone fragment, or by a weapon-and enters the brain tissue. Penetrating TBI typically damages only part of the brain. Non-penetrating TBI (blunt TBI) is caused by an external force strong enough to move the brain within the skull. Causes include falls, motor vehicle crashes, sports injuries, blast injury, or being struck by an object across the head. Brain Injury Awareness Month is also a time to encourage volunteers to help clinics find cures. Consider taking part in a clinical trial so clinicians and scientists can learn more about TBI and related disorders. Clinical research uses human volunteers to help researchers learn more about a disorder and perhaps find better ways to safely detect, treat, or prevent disease. All types of volunteers are needed; old or young, sick or healthy, male or female. Something that affects such a sizable portion of the population should be researched much more than it is now. Just think, if the money devoted to space exploration was given to the medical industry, how many more cures could.


Conspiracy Theories Explode When Princess Kate Disappears Written by: Anna Fitts


